LISTENING TO GOD'S WORD

The destruction of the temple and signs of the end times

Some of his disciples were remarking about how the temple was adorned with beautiful stones and with gifts dedicated to God. But Jesus said, 'As for what you see here, the time will come when not one stone will be left on another; every one of them will be thrown down.'

'Teacher,' they asked, 'when will these things happen? And what will be the sign that they are about to take place?'

He replied: 'Watch out that you are not deceived. For many will come in my name, claiming, "I am he," and, "The time is near." Do not follow them. When you hear of wars and uprisings, do not be frightened. These things must happen first, but the end will not come right away.'

Then he said to them: 'Nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom. There will be great earthquakes, famines and pestilences in various places, and fearful events and great signs from heaven.

'But before all this, they will seize you and persecute you. They will hand you over to synagogues and put you in prison, and you will be brought before kings and governors, and all on account of my name. And so you will bear testimony to me. But make up your mind not to worry beforehand how you will defend yourselves. For I will give you words and wisdom that none of your adversaries will be able to resist or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents, brothers and sisters, relatives and friends, and they will put some of you to death. Everyone will hate you because of me. But not a hair of your head will perish. Stand firm, and you will win life.

Trusting...

When I was a child, one of the places that we used to visit on a summer's Sunday afternoon was Badbury Rings, an Iron Age Fort near Wimborne. These grassy earthworks were a great place to explore and play! They are also a sign to us that, as a human race, we tend to distrust our neighbours and their motives and are often at war with them. Before Jesus was born, during the decades after his death, and over the centuries since the city's temple was destroyed, Jerusalem has been fought over by peoples, empires and nations. It is a salutary reminder to not jump to conclusions; Christ will come when he comes. All we can do is wait on his return, trusting in his promise as we do so.

Some of the things that Jesus said would happen have come to pass. In AD70, when some of his disciples were still alive, after a Jewish revolt, Roman soldiers invaded Jerusalem, destroyed the temple, and killed, enslaved or exiled the people. It must have felt like an end time.

But no, this was just part one. Part two was the persecution which Jews and Christians experienced at the hands of the Romans. If you were one of our Lord's followers during these violent times, you could well have found yourself in prison or dying for your faith. You needed to have true courage to stand firm and win life! Part three is the nearly 2,000 years of waiting on our Lord's return as King. During this time, there have been wars to end all wars, devastating plagues and pandemics, earthquakes, fires and famines. We can't know when the end is coming, but we do know that it will herald in a glorious new beginning for life on earth.

Do keep trusting as you wait! Stand firm, win life!
